The **Utah National Guard** has a unique dual mission that encompasses support to our nation and state.

The UTNG is comprised of two branches of the military, the Utah Army National Guard and the Utah Air National Guard. The adjutant general is the military commander of both branches and is appointed by the governor. While serving in a state status the governor serves as the commander in chief. This duty shifts to the president of the United States when forces are federalized for national missions.

The mission of the UTNG is to provide mission-ready military forces to assist both state and federal authorities in times of emergency or war. Since 1894, the UTNG has effectively trained, equipped, and prepared its members to accomplish that mission successfully. The UTNG stands ready to protect our citizens from enemies both foreign and domestic, and to react quickly in the face of natural disaster or emergency. We are always ready and always there.

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# FORT DOUGLAS MILITARY MUSEUM

*Utah Military Heritage and History*

The **Fort Douglas Military Museum** was designated by the Utah State Legislature as the state's official Military Museum. This recognition strengthens the Military Museum's efforts to preserve and interpret Utah's rich military history, educate visitors about the military's role in the growth and development throughout the state, and to engage communities and generations in honoring all Utahans who have served, continue to serve and those who support the Armed Forces.

**Visitors:** 6,072 total: 4,174 adults, 1,898 children, including visitors from out-of-state and foreign countries.

**Events:** During 2022, the Military Museum was back to pre-pandemic programming with special events and community engagements. Highlights include the Annual Post Cemetery Tour with living historians; introduction of Dark Tours, a series of walking tours sharing tales of the district's shadier side of history; partnering with Utah State University's "Bringing War Home" roadshows by collecting community stories and artifacts; hosting the Deseret Experimental Opera Company's "Mushroom Murders" based on Buffalo Soldiers stationed at Fort Douglas during the 1890s; conducting a Civil War Day 1862 with living history row and time-period talks; and finally, hosting the national reunion of WWII-era 104th National Timberwolf Pups Association.

**Of note:** The Military Museum continues to collect and preserve artifacts, provide assistance with historical research inquiries, conduct community lectures, and provide facilities operations for military- and veteran-oriented organizations. It continues to cooperate with established partnerships to engage the public through walking tours, virtual presentations, outside gatherings and in-person support.



University of Utah athletics turned to the Military Museum for inspiration, creativity and storytelling to bring the WWII heavy cruiser USS Salt Lake City to a new generation on the gridiron, basketball court and baseball field. For more than two years, a consortium of partners developed uniforms — notice the airbrushed details on helmets — built exhibitions, coordinated local and national ball games and gave one of the ship's three remaining survivors an experience of a lifetime.

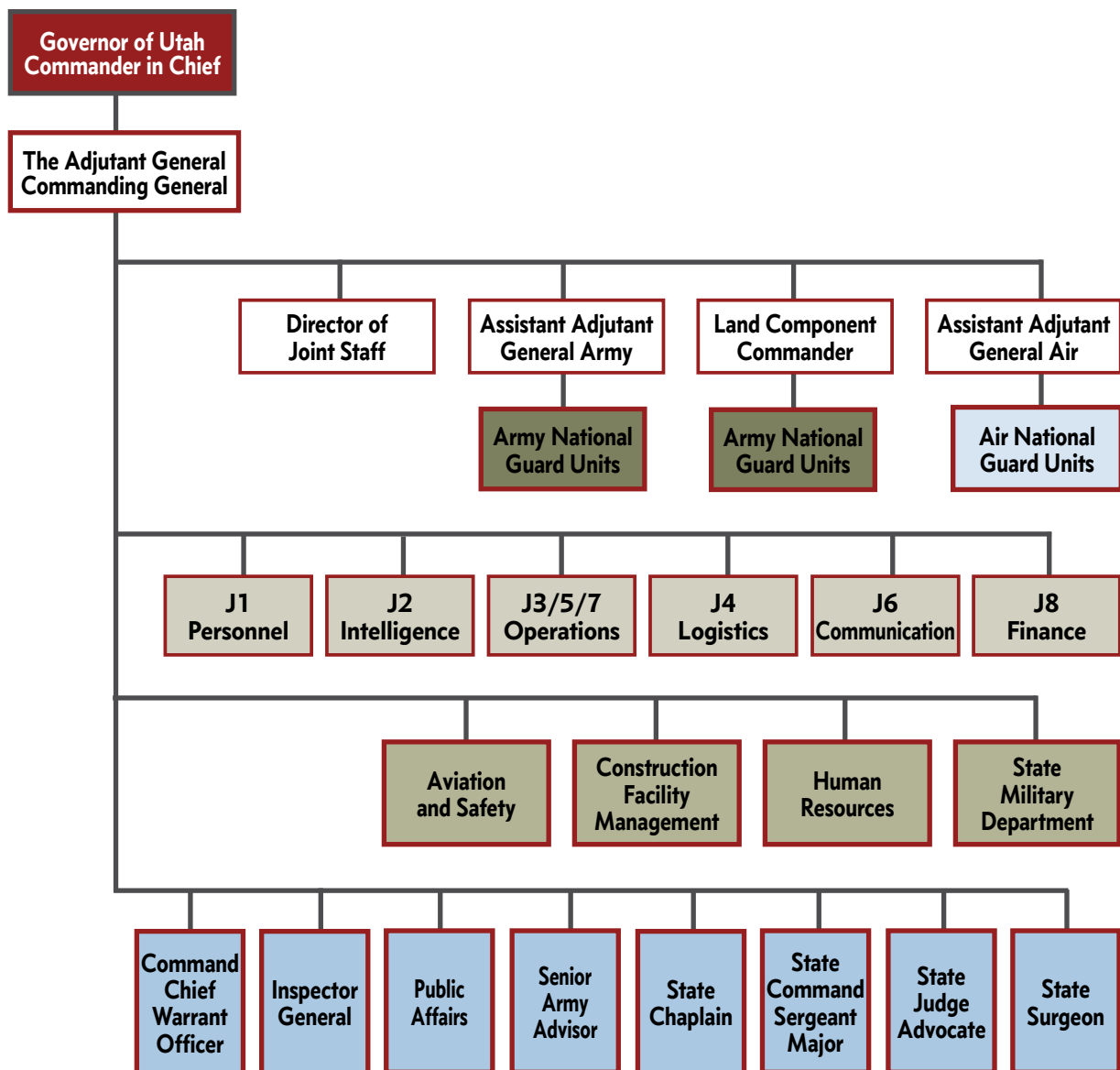

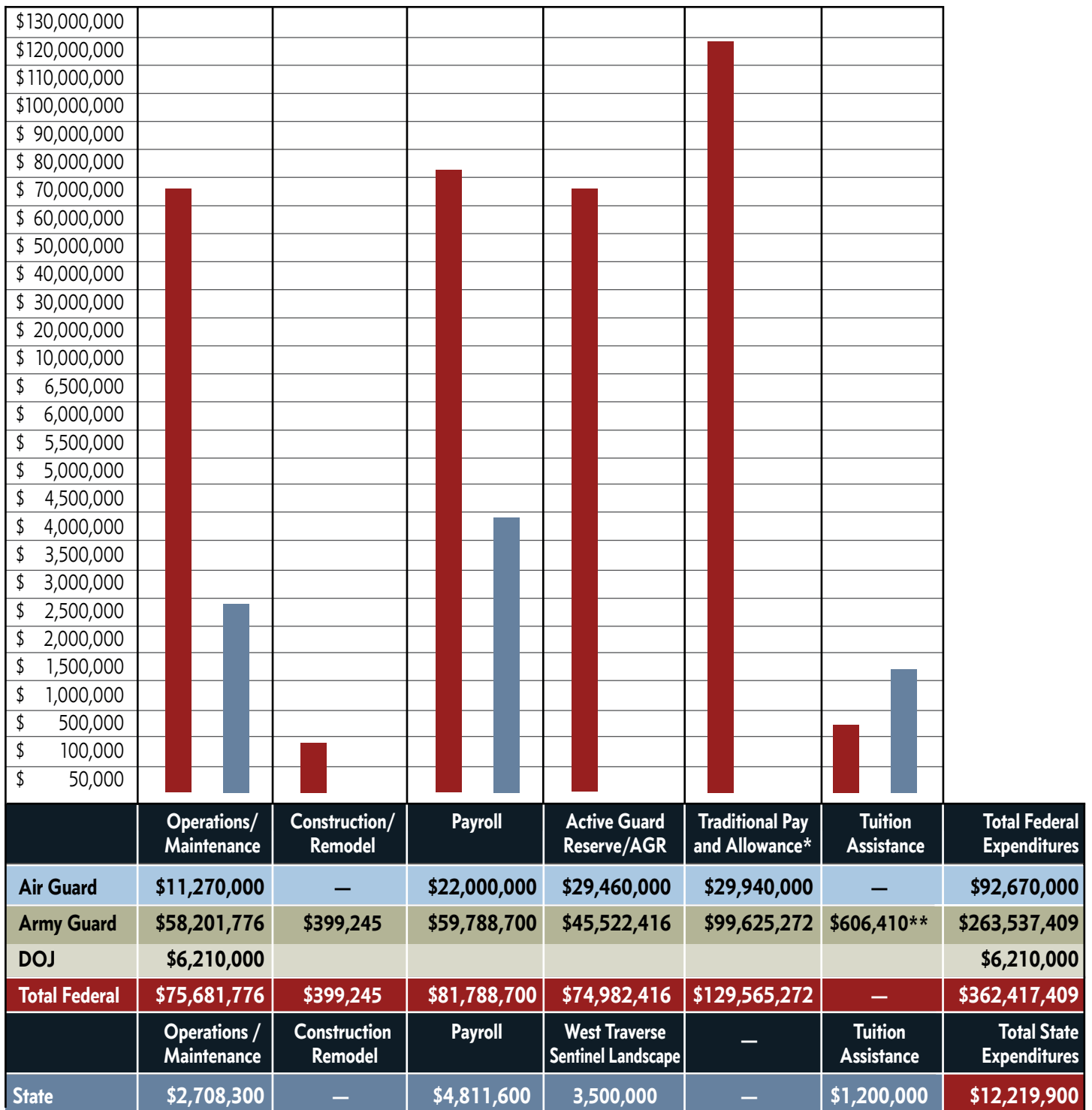

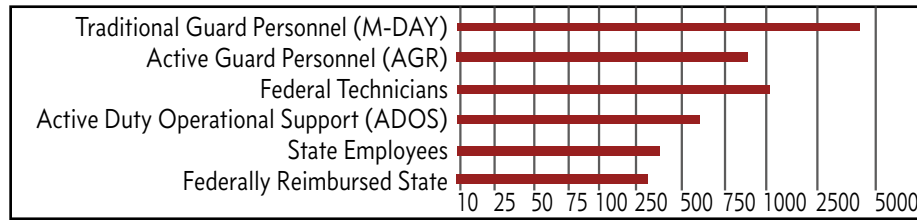

# JDOMS

**Joint Directorate of Military Support** began this year with a continuation of the Utah National Guard COVID mission. The mission expanded to include providing healthcare support to long-term healthcare facilities and hospitals in Clearfield, Ogden, Holladay, Draper, Riverton, Payson, and St. George. This support included filling in for nursing assistants and aides that had contracted COVID-19 and could not work, but patients in long-term hospital care as well as residential patients in long-term care facilities still needed critical aide. Due to this mission's significant impact and importance, it continued through the end of March 2022, completing nearly two years of critical support to the state's COVID-19 response mission under the Utah Department of Health, as well as to local health departments statewide. More than 500 Soldiers and Airmen supported this mission, and Utah communities benefited from their incredible support and willingness to serve.

Also in March, in coordination with our local governmental partners the DOMS facilitated and conducted a key communications exercise with the Utah County Search and Rescue, Civil Air Patrol, Utah Department of Emergency Management, and the Aviation Branch of the Utah Highway Patrol. This exercise allowed us to practice procedures and provide interoperable communications with each organization and develop important tactics and techniques for future multi-agency responses.

In May, the DOMS section attended the annual statewide Public Safety Summit, with more than 400 first responders and emergency managers attending. During this event DOMS

presented topics and initiatives on emerging trends, National Guard capabilities, and how to best integrate National Guard resources during an emergency. This was key in continuing to develop not only our professional partnerships, but also in gaining a better understanding of how we each respond to emergencies and work together to support communities in need.

DOMS coordinated several aviation search and rescue missions throughout the year, specifically for lost hikers in remote areas and lost motorists who were exploring Utah and broke down outside of areas with cellphone reception. Many of these individuals had planned accordingly, however as Utah's weather and terrain are diverse, it is important to remain available to provide this crucial aid for the state of Utah. The UTNG is fortunate to have the resources, technology, and expertise to continue to aid our local partners with searches and rescues.

Beginning in the spring and culminating in September, the UTNG began coordinating with the Utah County Emergency Management and sheriff's department to conduct a multi-agency disaster exercise simulating a search and rescue for a downed aircraft. The exercise included providing two UH-60 Black Hawk helicopters to airlift containers carrying critical equipment necessary to set up an Incident Command Post in a very remote location. This mission was a complete success and provided each agency a better understanding of how we would perform these functions if an actual event of this nature were to occur.

A UH-60 Black Hawk helicopter and crew members transported search and rescue volunteers up Mapleton Canyon where they were dropped off to begin their search efforts and later returned back to the incident command center. The Black Hawk crew also conducted search efforts from the air. Local search and rescue support demonstrates Utah National Guard readiness and strengthens partnerships with local civilian agencies.

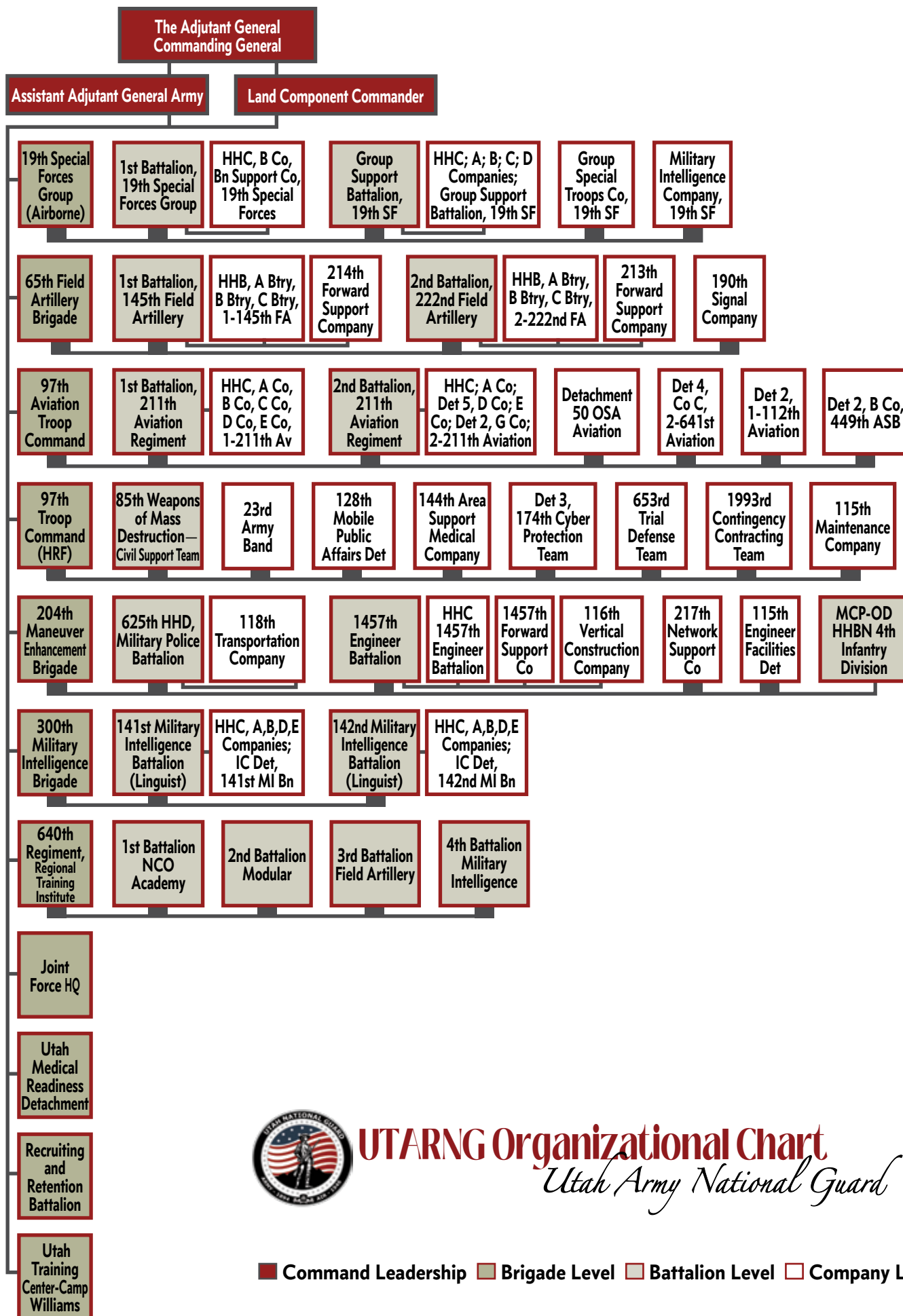

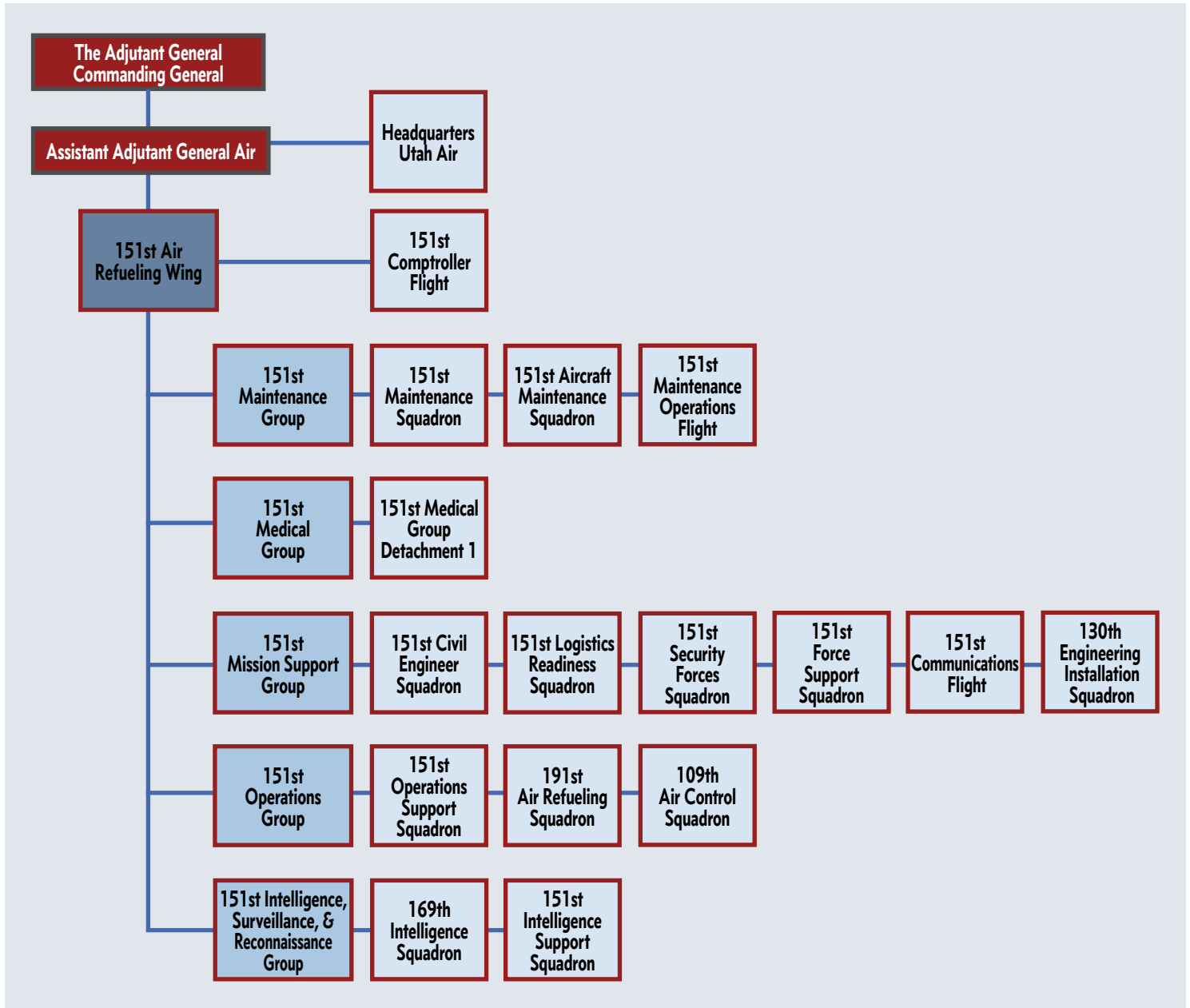

Additionally, the ISRG has 12 support agreements in place to provide long-term, in-depth analysis and reporting services to other national-level intelligence producers and consumers.
